



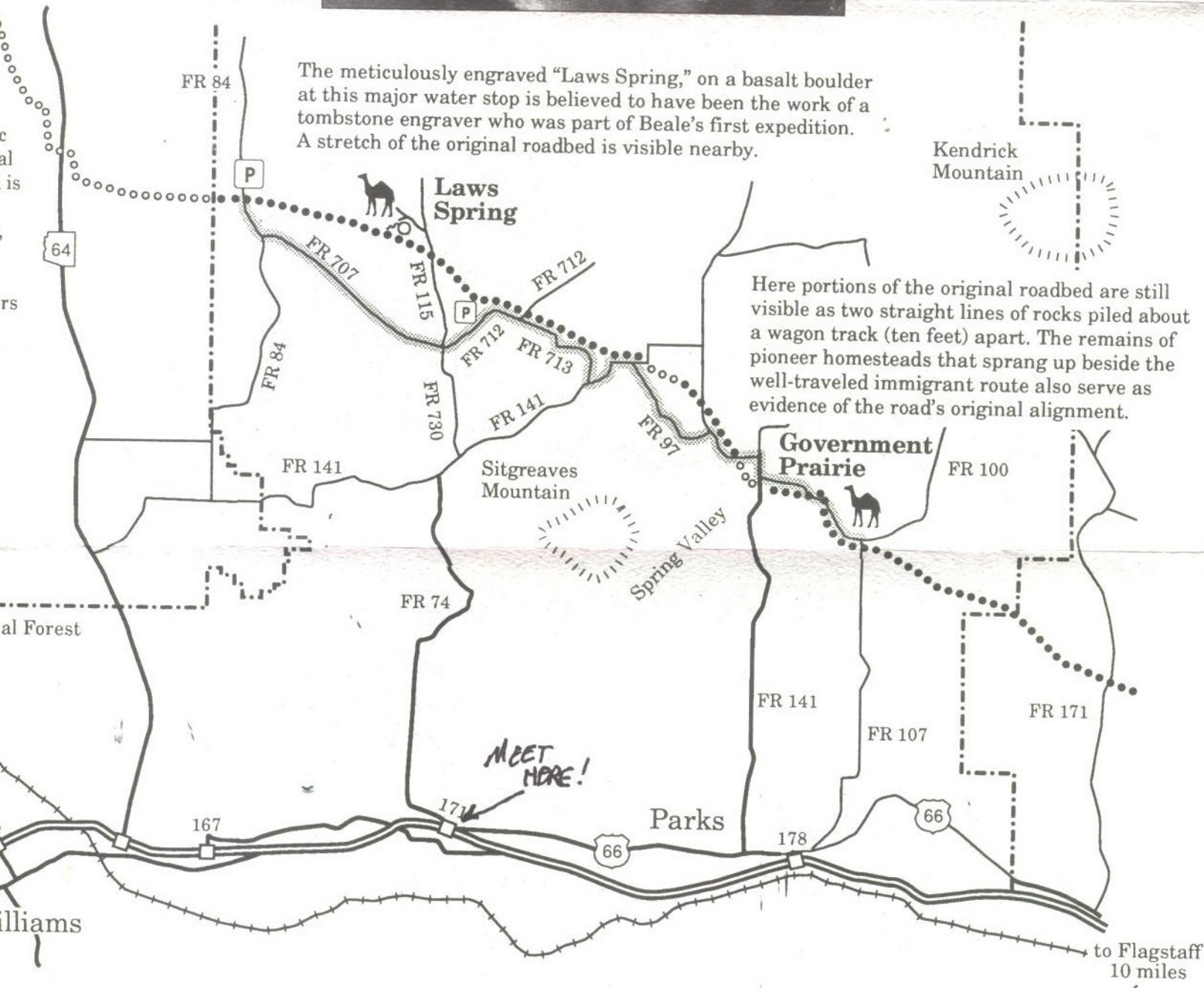

The meticulously engraved "Laws Spring," on a basalt boulder at this major water stop is believed to have been the work of a tombstone engraver who was part of Beale's first expedition. A stretch of the original roadbed is visible nearby.

Kendrick Mountain



Here portions of the original roadbed are still visible as two straight lines of rocks piled about a wagon track (ten feet) apart. The remains of pioneer homesteads that sprang up beside the well-traveled immigrant route also serve as evidence of the road's original alignment.



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
